ERASMUS+ GUIDE FOR ARCHIP STUDENTS

MOBILITY FOR INTERNSHIPS, APPLICABLE FOR 2023/24 and SUMMER 2024

What is Erasmus+ and what benefits does its internship program have?

Erasmus+ is a large educational platform launched by the European Commission which encompasses a number of activities. For university students, the two most important activities include study-abroad and internship mobilities.

The first option means that the Erasmus+ program enables students to take a semester abroad at a partner institution of their home university. For study abroad opportunities, see respective parts of ARCHIP website.

The second option <u>facilitates student internships abroad</u> and grants students as well as graduates a monthly allowance to cover the cost of accommodation and living in case their internship is not paid. This is a great opportunity to gain experience in a prestigious firm or company while being able to cover some of the living costs through the Erasmus+ financial support.

What are the conditions?

Conditions are simple. Your internship has to be in an architectural firm or in a company or an institution that is connected to what you study. The rules of the programme further state that you cannot do an internship in one of the official bodies of the European Union.

Second condition is that your weekly workload is 25h or more.

When and for how long can I go for an internship?

In this round of applications, ARCHIP students can apply for internships starting in June 2022. Any student can apply, including freshmen, regardless of nationality or age.

The programme also includes <u>traineeship opportunities for fresh graduates</u> under following conditions:

- Participants have to arrange their traineeship <u>before</u> graduating.
- Participants cannot be enrolled in studies during the time of their traineeship.
- The traineeship can start the 1st day after graduation and can last until the 360th day (i.e. one year) after graduation.

Minimum period for an internship or a traineeship is 60 days, maximum is 360 days. However, we would like to ask our students to plan internships for 150 days maximum with a possibility to extend it before it ends. This way, we can ensure funding for any student that deserves the opportunity. If you'd like to extend your internship, just e-mail our international office a month before your original internship ends.

Where can I go?

You have to do the internship <u>outside</u> the Czech Republic, in any Erasmus+ programme country (EU, EFTA, Serbia, Macedonia, Turkey, **not** the UK).

Important feature of the programme is that <u>you are the one to select the firm</u>. Once you approach it, you can apply for the internship mobility. Later, we'll need a letter of acceptance from the firm. If we know of a call for interns from a firm abroad, we will of course let you know.

What are the financial conditions?

Erasmus+ program offers a <u>standard monthly allowance for interns</u>* ranging from EUR 630 to EUR 750 depending on your country of destination. See table below for country specifications. This scholarship will be transferred to your account before you leave for your Erasmus+.

EUR 630: Bulgaria, Croatia, Estonia, Hungary, Latvia, Lithuania, North Macedonia, Poland, Romania, Serbia, Slovakia, Slovenia, Turkey

EUR 750: Austria, Belgium, Cyprus, Denmark, France, Germany, Greece, Iceland, Ireland, Italy, Liechtenstein, Luxembourg, Malta, Netherlands, Norway, Portugal, Spain, Sweden

*month = 30 days, your total allowance is counted proportionally and paid in full before you leave

Erasmus+ internship <u>does not affect (or add to) your tuition</u> at ARCHIP. If you decide to do a one-semester internship while being a student, you won't have to pay tuition during that semester, but you will obviously have to pay tuition once you're back and you have to extend your studies.

Graduates naturally don't pay any tuition when doing the traineeship abroad.

Trainees should not be classified as 'workers' – that means you should not have any kind of work contract with the firm. Some firms may grant you some kind of financial support (e.g. for accommodation, transport etc.) or internship money. This is – by all means – allowed!

How does the internship work within the ARCHIP study plan?

In order <u>not</u> to extend your studies at ARCHIP, you can take on a summer internship (and of course the graduate traineeship since you'll be done with your studies then).

If you'd like to take on a longer internship (e.g. five months or more), you can of course do that, and ARCHIP will enable you to do that. You will however have to extend your studies. We recommend combining this with a study-abroad Erasmus+ stay, if possible and there is funding available.

Furthermore, if you'd like, Erasmus+ internship will grant you <u>credits from the 'Preparing for Practice' course</u> upon fulfilling all the necessary steps.

What deadlines should I keep an eye on?

The deadline for the Erasmus+ internship and graduate traineeship applications is March 31. In case there are funds still left after the first application round, you'll be then able to apply anytime. You'll know whether we confirmed your internship in a week after the deadline or a week after your application has been submitted.

Exceptions to the system of deadlines are possible in urgent cases (e.g. if you need the decision earlier for the firm to know).

How does the process work, step by step?

1. APPROACH THE FIRM.

First, you have to approach the company and see if they'd be interested in hosting you as an intern or trainee. If you need an introductory letter from ARCHIP to support your request, let our international office know and obtain your own copy.

The company has to be an architectural firm or an organization active in fields that are close to what you study. This step is essential for your application.

2. SUBMIT APPLICATION.

Fill in the application found online and submit it to our international office – we'll let you know whether you passed the ARCHIP round soon. The application has to be filled in to indicate your interest in participation.

If the application is not available online, you can also email the international office and indicate 1) your interest in taking the internship abroad, 2) dates of your envisioned internship, 3) firm address and contact.

3. GET AN ADMISSION LETTER.

Once you have passed the ARCHIP round, we will want an admission letter from the firm as a proof. Now, you're <u>officially admitted</u> for the Erasmus+ internship programme.

4. PREPARATION - LEARNING AGREEMENT.

Together with your mentor at the receiving firm and with ARCHIP's international office, you fill in a learning agreement for internships. Make sure that your work content is described properly, you have specified your workload per week and the exact dates of your stay abroad. The dates are essential for your allowance amount and they are <u>not changeable</u> after.

5. PREPARATION - PRACTICALITIES.

Two practicalities are remaining at this point: you have to make sure that you have a bank account that allows SEPA payments (i.e. almost every European account) and that you are insured for the whole period of your internship. If unsure, you might want to discuss insurance requirements and options with our international office as well as the firm.

If you have a Russian bank account, please contact us first.

6. REMAINING PAPERWORK - GRANT AGREEMENT.

You sign the Erasmus+ grant agreement and other paperwork at ARCHIP's international office. Based on the agreement, you'll get the full allowance transferred to your account before leaving abroad.

7. YOUR INTERNSHIP.

When you come to your place or internship, make sure to get the confirmation of the internship period signed. Then enjoy your new experience!

8. PAPERWORK ABROAD.

At the end of your internship, your mentor has to fill in the traineeship certificate which is a part of the learning agreement. This also serves as proof to us. Your internship's end date should be the <u>same as indicated in your learning agreement</u>, else your scholarship will be slightly reduced.

9. COMING BACK.

You come back, hand in the paperwork and sign up for credits from the PC module, in case you'd like that. If everything's in order, you're good to proceed with your studies (or with your life if you're a graduate – good luck!)
